

## Spring Activities: Blossoms all Around

In Japan during springtime a famous festival called Hanami takes place. Hanami can be translated as flower viewing because from March until May Japanese people go to parks with their family and friends and gather under trees in bloom. They especially enjoy the Cherry blossoms (*Sakura*), but also Plum (*Ume*) and Peach (*Momo*) trees. In Korea and China they also celebrate the blossoming of trees with festivals such as the Yeouido Spring Festival or the Wuhan University Cherry Flower Festival.



## Write and Explore

Japanese – and also Chinese - characters are formed by strokes combined in different ways. Characters are written following the same order – left to right and top to bottom

### Write

A haiku, like the example below, is a type of very short traditional poem. It consists of three sentences of around 17 syllables.

"What a strange thing!
to be alive
beneath cherry blossoms."
- Kobayashi Issa, Poems



### Make



### Tree (Easy)






### Cherry Tree (Intermediate)





### Plum Tree (Intermediate)






# Activity
