

The Empty Pot: A tale of honesty, flowers, and... pots!


The Chinese are known for making amazing art, and one of the most popular types of object are porcelain 'pots', also known as *china*. Porcelain is made using a very special technique, in which ceramics are fired at a very high temperature (between 1200 °C - 1400 °C), which was first discovered by the Chinese. Like glass, porcelain is extremely hard and watertight, but also very delicate.

It took a long time for the Chinese to perfect this technnique, but it is believed that porcelain as we know it was developed during the Han Dynasty, 2000 years ago! Around 400 years ago, Chinese porcelain became so popular that people from around the world started ordering pots, plates, and other porcelain objects. This meant that people from Europe and other far-flung continents had the opportunity to understand Chinese art and culture through its ceramics.


